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Sheriff's Office unveils new coin

The Clear Creek County Sheriff's Office is marking new beginnings with the unveiling of its new coin.

The coins are typically given out as a token of recognition for good act and service.

"I want to say thank you to those of you who took the time to enter the challenge coin contest. After closely examining the submissions and consulting with Command Staff, we chose the coin Sue LeBarron designed as the winner," Sheriff Matthew Harris said. "I have to say I love the design of this coin. It represents the positive changes we have made and will continue to make, and emphasizes our commitment to service, community, and partnership."

Sue LeBarron is not only a community member, but also the Manager of Charlie's Place, the animal shelter for Clear Creek and Gilpin Counties.

"I thought about the messages the revamped Sheriff's Office was trying to convey and came up with the concepts of partnership with the community and new beginnings," LeBarron said. "From there, I generated images using the AI tools that Bing offers and put it together using Canva."

The coin is expected to start being handed out once it is manufactured.

"It was a pleasant surprise to have my design picked. It was new territory for me to design anything like this. I'm looking forward to seeing how the finished product looks," LeBarron added. "I'd like to see more contests like this to give employees the opportunity to make a contribution, and feel like they are a part of things."

Teamwork makes the dream work! Clear Creek EMS works with Empire PD



In March, the Empire Police Department received a 911 call for a male party who was unconscious and not breathing. Empire Police Chief Lorenz, along with Clear Creek EMS, Clear Creek Fire Authority, and the Sheriff's Office responded and were able to provide life-saving measuring using an AED to help this individual become stable and able to be transferred to the hospital.

For background, last year, the Empire Police Department partnered with Clear Creek EMS to train its staff and equip each vehicle with an AED for this very reason.

In addition, the Empire Police Department donated a ballistic vest to the Clear Creek Health Assistance Team (CCHAT). The Director, Elizabeth Gallagher (pictured above, center) will be able to assist residents of Clear Creek County on mental health calls.

Snowstorm prompts County to issue disaster declaration: what does this mean?



On March 14th, Clear Creek County declared a Local Disaster Emergency due to heavy amounts of snow and stranded motorists.

This declaration enabled the County to activate certain response plans and makes the County eligible for funds and resources from the State that may become available to support the response to the snowstorm situation and issues that it may have caused.

The event, caused dozens of motorists to get stranded on I-70 as the highway shut down due to accidents.

“This snowstorm stretched the County’s resources,” Clear Creek County Office of Emergency Management Director Suzanne Boccia said at the time of the declaration. “At this time, we are asking the public to stay home and off the roads.

This is a serious situation and we want our first responders to be able to get to those that need help. The safety of the public is our top priority.”

Clear Creek County thanks its first responders that worked around the clock to help those in need during the snowstorm, even using the County's Snowcat (right) machine to help save stranded drivers in the snowy conditions.

The declaration expired a week after the snow event. Gilpin County also declared a Local Disaster that day as well.



County Leaders participate in Gateway to the Rockies Opioid Council Conference



Several Clear Creek County directors, officials, and commissioners attended the Gateway to the Rockies Opioid Council (GROC) conference in February to learn more about the opioid epidemic and continue discussions regarding the opioid settlement the region has and will receive.

Opioid addiction and overdoses have devastated families and communities across Colorado, and the crisis poses a serious threat to the state's public health, safety and economy. As a result of several historic settlements with major drug manufacturers and distributors, the Colorado Department of Law is distributing nearly \$750 million in opioid settlement dollars throughout the state for substance use treatment, recovery, and prevention programs.

The majority of the dollars will be distributed to 19 regions for local governments, including Region 10 (GROC) which consists of Clear Creek, Gilpin and Jefferson counties. Conference attendees heard from Colorado Attorney General Phil Weiser, young adults overcoming substance misuse, the region's first round of grant awardees, and more.

The conference addressed what the dollars mean for our region in tackling the opioid epidemic and helped inform how best to allocate the region's funding. "I'm really proud of our communities up here," Clear Creek County Commissioner George Marlin said. "There was representation from our municipalities, commissioners, and county department heads. If how you spend your time is an indicator of priorities, then I'm proud to know that we are unified in Clear Creek around the need to confront this crisis."

So far, this money is being used to help expand the County's CCHAT co-reponder team.



Harm reduction supplies available in Clear Creek County

Public Health is offering FREE Harm Reduction kits!


What's in each bag:

Naloxone: Naloxone is an opioid antagonist – it binds to opioid receptors and blocks or reverses the effects of the overdose agent. It works from 30-90 minutes after administration. A full dose can be given every two-to-three minutes until the person is awake. You cannot overdose someone on Naloxone. According to the CDC, **in nearly 40% of overdose deaths, someone else was present.** Having

naloxone available allows bystanders to help a fatal overdose and save lives.

Fentanyl test strips: Fentanyl test strips are small strips of paper that can detect the presence of Fentanyl in all different kinds of drugs. Fentanyl is synthetic opioid that is 50 times more potent than heroin, and 100 times more potent than morphine. According to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), it is the single deadliest drug threat our nation has ever encountered. Synthetic opioids caused 71,000 deaths in the United States and 1,258 deaths in Colorado alone in 2021. These kits are free and can be picked up by anyone at 1969 Miner St. in Idaho Springs. Kits are also available at the Clear Creek County Sheriff's Office in Gerogetown.

Military Feature: Clear Creek County Native Joxan Guerrero



Clear Creek County is proud to feature its very own service members that selflessly choose to serve our country. Our Veterans and members of the military have enabled all Americans to enjoy the freedoms we hold today, and we feel it is important to highlight them, not only on holidays, but throughout the year.

Meet Petty Officer 3rd Class Joxan Guerrero, a Clear Creek County native from Empire, who is a Gas Turbine Systems Technician Mechanic in the United States Navy.

Guerrero, like a lot of young people, wasn't sure about what he wanted to do after high school, when he got a call one day.

"It was my senior year and I was like, I don't know what I want to do at all," he said. "About a couple of weeks after that phone call, I called them again."

After talking it over with his mom, Guerrero decided to set up a meeting with the recruiter.

"I went and it sounded pretty fun. They were traveling, all this kind of stuff, all the benefits. And I was like, you know what? I didn't want to just stay in Colorado, I wanted to get out and go explore. It forced me out of my shell."

Since joining the Navy, he has done his fair share of exploring.

"We went to the Marshall Islands. We went to Brisbane, Australia, Manila, Philippines, Okinawa, Japan, Yokosuka, Japan, Tokyo, Japan, and Guam."

Guerrero enjoys the travel, but he also enjoys the work he is doing on the ship.

"I'm on sea duty, I'm stationed on a ship. We'll be in port for sometimes a couple of months, we'll fix up the ship and get it ready to go out to sea. Then we start RIMPAC [the world's largest international maritime exercise]. There are so many countries. We all come together."

For Guerrero, he doesn't see serving as work, and he is happy to represent his country while bonding with his fellow Sailors. His family sees it as more than that.

"Every single day they tell me how proud they are and how happy they are that I like what I am doing, and I am somewhere where I'm happy to be. Honestly, it's fun, and I love it."

National Child Abuse Prevention Month and the Impact of Domestic Violence

-With facts and information from Connections for Abused Women and their Children (CAWC) and the Clear Creek Advocates

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, a time dedicated to raising awareness and fostering understanding about the critical issue of child abuse and its prevention. Within this context, it's essential to explore the deeply intertwined relationship between domestic or intimate partner violence (IPV) and child abuse.

The Overlapping Realities of Domestic Violence and Child Abuse

Violence of any kind in a household with children is child abuse. Child abuse is defined as any non-accidental injury or pattern of injuries to a minor, including physical injury, neglect, sexual molestation, and psychological or emotional abuse. The trauma from witnessing domestic violence can have long-lasting effects on kids and teens, and these are similar to those experienced by children who have been directly abused in other ways. Research reveals a disturbing overlap between domestic violence and child abuse, with exposure to IPV being a significant risk factor for other, more direct forms of child abuse within the home.

Resources in Clear Creek County: *The Clear Creek County Advocates* is a non-profit, community-based victim service organization that provides comprehensive trauma-informed and inclusive support to victims of crime and trauma while promoting community education regarding victimization and crime prevention in Clear Creek County. Rural communities like ours can face issues that follow with under-representation and under-reporting of crimes and other traumatic events. We strive to connect people with the best resources available. We want to challenge stigmas that leave people behind. We are here to support people through some of the roughest days of their lives, and we believe there is no shame in speaking to the toll trauma can take. April 30th is National Adopt a Shelter Pet Day!

Each year, National Adopt a Shelter Pet Day on April 30th raises awareness for thousands of pets that are waiting for (and needing) adoption from the shelters. Charlie's Place, which serves both Clear Creek and Gilpin counties is no exception.

"Adoptions are lower than they've ever been and surrenders are at their highest," Shelter Manger Sue LeBarron said. "We're doing our best to keep Charlie's Place operating as a no-kill animal shelter."



The shelter offers the public surrender and adoption services, microchipping, and spay/neuter vouchers for dogs and cats, and dog licenses. In addition, the shelter periodically hosts vaccination and wellness clinics for dogs and cats (April 7th). Charlie's Place shelter staff are dedicated to educating the public about responsible pet ownership and are committed to finding loving, appropriate homes for adoptable shelter animals.

"We are excited to have three new part-time employees, Brittany Scribner, Sarah Brown, and Matt Teuling. Our Assistant Manager, Stephanie Lamb, is doing great work helping with the behavior needs of our dogs and cats," LeBarron added. "We have a small army of dedicated volunteers who make it possible to give our shelter animals a good quality of life. It takes a village to make the shelter work."

Fire Authority seeking community input for Community Wildfire Protection Plan



Clear Creek Emergency Medical Services is excited to announce an upcoming blood drive to benefit our neighbors and others in need in Clear Creek County.

The blood drive, in partnership with Vitalant, will take place on Wednesday, April 24th at 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the County Commissioner Meeting room located at 405 Argentine Street in Georgetown.

For background, all Paramedics at Clear Creek EMS are required to attain Critical Care Endorsement through the state of Colorado within one year of being hired. This is the highest level of training and certification possible for a Paramedic. This allows the crews of Clear Creek EMS to provide some of the most

progressive care available to patients outside of a hospital environment. Clear Creek EMS can now treat patients using interventions that would have previously required a helicopter.

With the success of the Critical Care Program, Clear Creek EMS will be one of the first ground ambulance agencies in the state to carry whole blood on the ambulance.

“This will allow us to provide immediate, life-saving intervention to the most serious trauma patients at the scene,” Clear Creek EMS Director Aaron Crawley said. “This blood drive and our neighbors' selfless blood donations will help us save even more lives in Clear Creek County. We are committed to providing the highest level of care possible to the residents and visitors of our community.”

County decides on new road names to replace formerly derogatory ones

After receiving and compiling the results of Clear Creek County's Road Renaming Survey, the County has come to a decision on the new road names to replace the formerly derogatory ones. For background, in 2021, the Board on Geographic Names renamed Squ*w Mountain to Mestaa'èhehe Mountain. The change comes after filings from the Northern Cheyenne Tribe's objections and hearings of the Colorado Geographic Naming Advisory Board to change the term Squ*w, which is a dated and derogatory term formerly used to represent Native women.

The new road names are: Pine Valley Road will replace Old Sq*w Pass Road, Blue Sky Road will replace Little Squ*w Pass Road, and Raven Ridge Road will replace Squ*w Mountain Trail. We are pleased that we were able to get nearly 70 percent of the residents that live on each of these roads to give us their valuable input on this topic.

The County's Road and Bridge Department is already in the process of replacing the old street signs and is expected to have the new ones installed in April. A letter with more information will be mailed to the affected residents soon.

Road and Bridge: Keeping us moving in all conditions!



The Clear Creek County Road and Bridge team spent countless hours clearing the roads and making sure residents and first responders were able to get to those in need during March's snowstorm. Nearly three feet of snow fell in parts of the County, wreaking havoc on the County's main and side roads--but the team wasn't far behind, working all hours of the night and days after to ensure the roads got cleared.


"From Brook Forest - Thank you to the plow crews that finally made it to us on Sunday night. Yes we were last, but somebody has to be last. They did a spectacular job, not just the minimum, and we bless them for it," one resident said.

"I second this! They did great work in our neighborhood," another resident chimed in.

Some younger residents even took to the artistic medium to show their thanks, drawing pictures for the crews that plowed their road. Ivy and Forrest sent the above drawings to the team after seeing a plow drive by and clear the road where they live.

The Road and Bridge Department is responsible for maintaining the condition of over 200 miles of roads within the County, rain or shine. Winter maintenance includes snow removal from roadways, ice and water control, sanding icy conditions, and some avalanche control. Summer maintenance involves the grading of roadways; the replacement or addition of road surface materials such as road base, gravel, or asphalt; and some water control.

Thank you Road and Bridge for all of your hard work!



In March of 1879, the *Colorado Miner* reported on the “prosperous mining camp near the head of Trail Creek [that] continues to increase in the number of inhabitants, and we are confidently assured by one who has thoroughly studied this subject, that this augmentation, by immigration and other means, will certainly continue. Our own observations, and the acknowledged reliability of our informant, enable us to endorse this opinion with a great deal of confidence. There are now twenty-nine legally ordained families in the gulch, and the better half and collaterals of the thirtieth are journeying from Kansas with trunks marked, ‘Freeland, Colorado.’ The proportion of bachelor establishments is exceedingly small for a mining camp, there being but six, and their proprietors are correspondingly lonesome.

“Business is conducted on strictly puritanic principles, and, as a consequence, the town is severely moral. In this respect Freeland cheerfully invites any mining camp in the State, of similar proportions, to step on the tail of its coat, and if the law compelled us to back our opinion with a wager we would go two to one on the Trail Run camp. The enticing jingle of beer glasses have not yet been heard there; and if a Freelandite indulges in bibulous dissipation he does it in silence and alone.

“A Presbyterian church was organized last August, and Mr. W. D. Price, who is a lay member of that denomination, and the village blacksmith, holds divine service every Sunday. The Sunday school was commenced about fourteen months ago, and there has not been a single intermission since that time. There are now from 28 to 30 scholars.


“J. D. Armstrong is the P.M. [post master] and is in receipt of a daily mail; but judging from the fact that he does not receive the *Miner* before Monday or Tuesday, we are induced to believe that branch of the U.S. Mail routes is somewhat demoralized.

“Mr. Kramer is associated with the Postmaster in a general merchandise store, which is the principal store in the camp, and the location of the P.O. [post office]. The stock is not large but extremely varied.

“Edward Jones & Co. run a similar establishment in the old stone mill, and in the same building John T. Jones keeps a meat market. This also serves as the headquarters for a disciple of St. Crispin, whose name we do not give because we do not know it.

“There is no day school in the camp, at present, but we are informed by Mr. Price, one of the school board, that it is the intention of the board to open school as soon as possible, and that they are now negotiating for the services of a teacher.

“We would remark in conclusion that the style of architecture adopted here is more advanced than that usually seen in a nascent mining camp, and is steadily improving. This superiority is doubtless owing to the saw mill some distance above which is run in connection with the Freeland mine.”






