In addition, she has worked as Legal Counsel for a prominent energy company in Denver and contributed to legislative analysis for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and a U.S. Congressman in Washington, D.C.

Beyond her professional accomplishments, Commissioner Lloyd is deeply committed to her community. She has volunteered extensively with the Clear Creek School District and is a strong supporter of local organizations dedicated to the region's well-being.

Commissioner Lloyd is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College and George Washington University Law School. She holds a second-degree black belt in Tae Kwon Do and enjoys hiking, biking, skiing, and theatre.
